Book Critique

- A book critique is an evaluation of the book
- A book critique is not a summary
- At INT it is used to develop analytical thinking and skills as we look at national transformation

Book Critique content

- Introduction
- Summary
- Evaluation / Analysis
- Conclusion

Introduction

- Introduce the author, title of the book, genre, and prior work or achievements
- State the authors main point. What is the take away
- An overall objective evaluation

Summary

- Behave like a reporter
- Don't give your opinion
- It should not be more than a quarter of your work
- Cover all themes of the book,
- Avoid summarising chapter by chapter

Analysis

- Behave like a judge
- Be objective
- Don't criticize but critique
- Counter arguments - Pros and Cons or Strengths and Weaknesses

Criteria for Analysis

- Accuracy of information
- Are there any hidden assumptions
- What do you think the author for right or wrong
- Is the language clear
- Is the content fair
- Is the flow of work logical
- What do agree with or disagree wirh

- What could Ugandan marketplace leaders learn from the book for national transformation
- What in the book has been beneficial to your present personal leadership journey
- Would you recommend the book to other marketplace leaders and why?

Speed Reading

1. First read the Table of Contents, Forward, Introduction and the back of the book
2. The most important things author wants to communicate are there
3. Don't sub-vocalise
 - Don't read to yourself
 - Don't read out the words
4. Try reading in a relaxed environment – classical music
5. Force your eye to move across the page to avoid visual regression
6. Learn to see things as a group of words

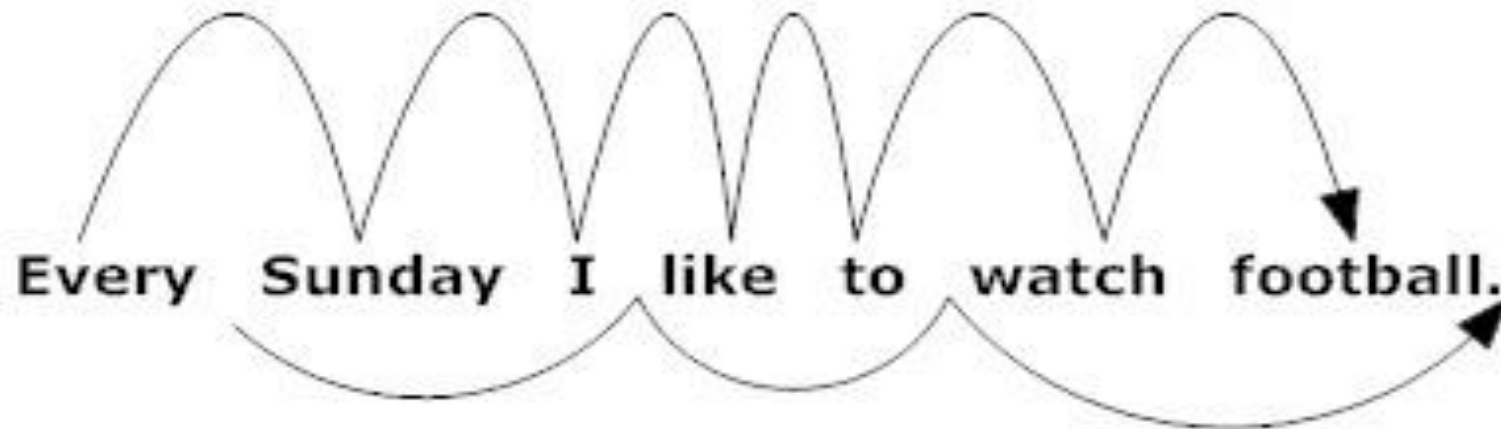

Speed Reading

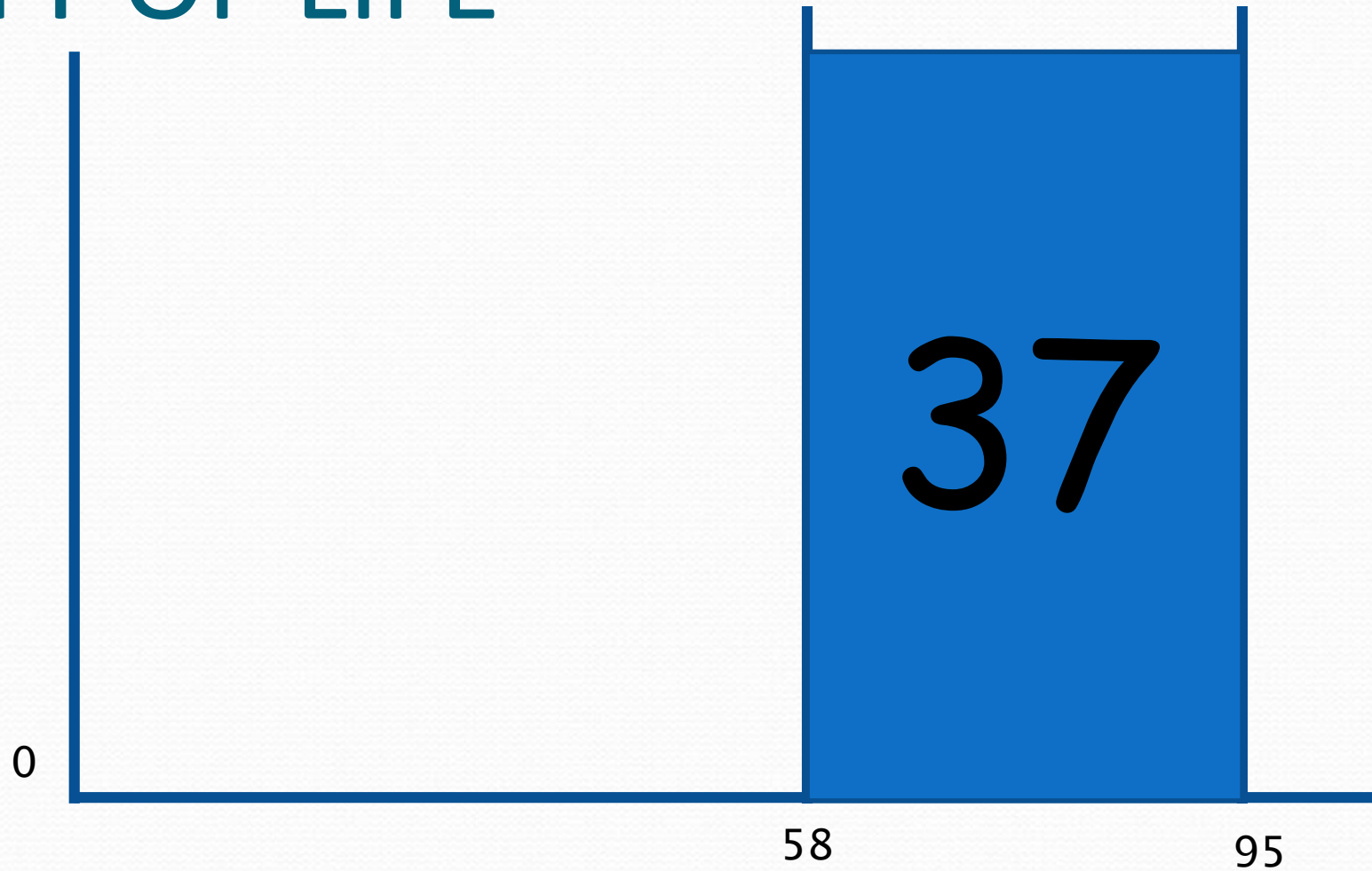
Chapter Reading

What is an INT project? ..

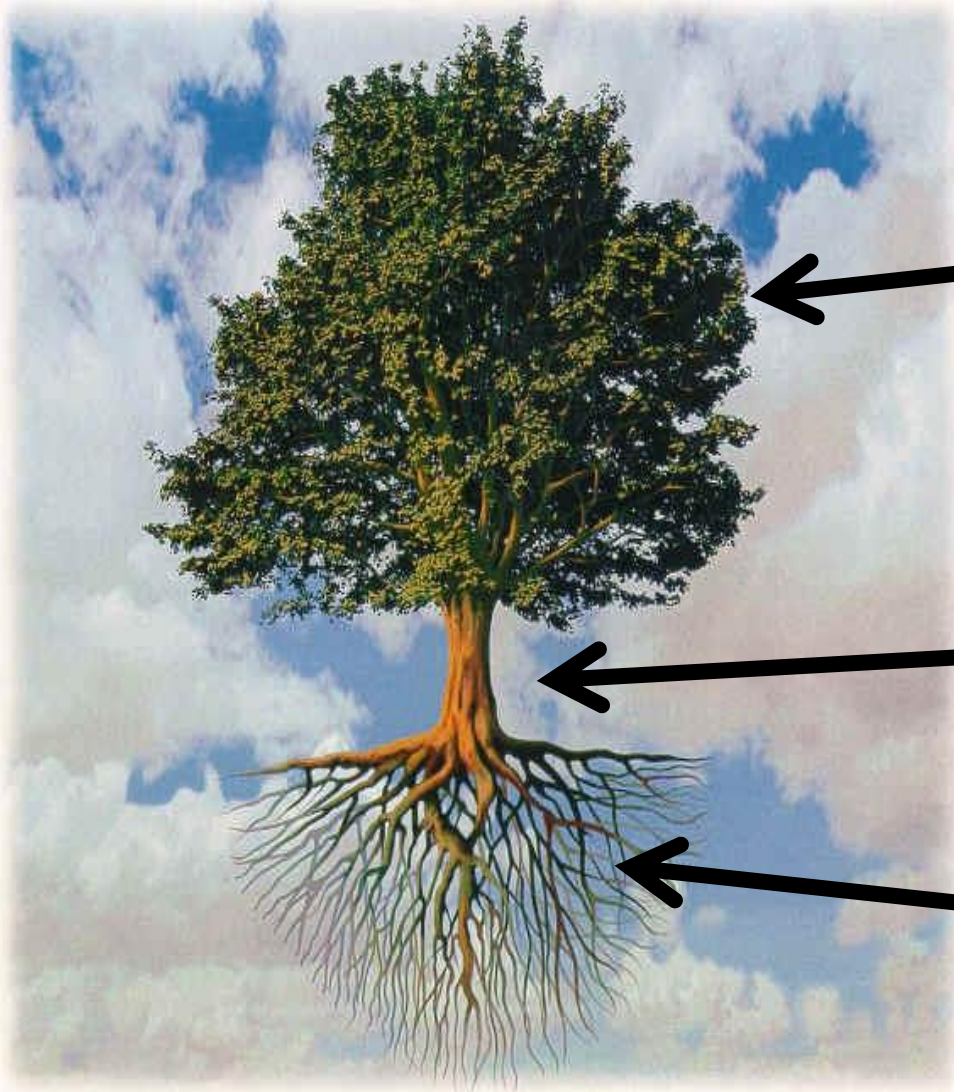
1. INT Projects are to be solutions to problems..”

A tool to breaking down your project



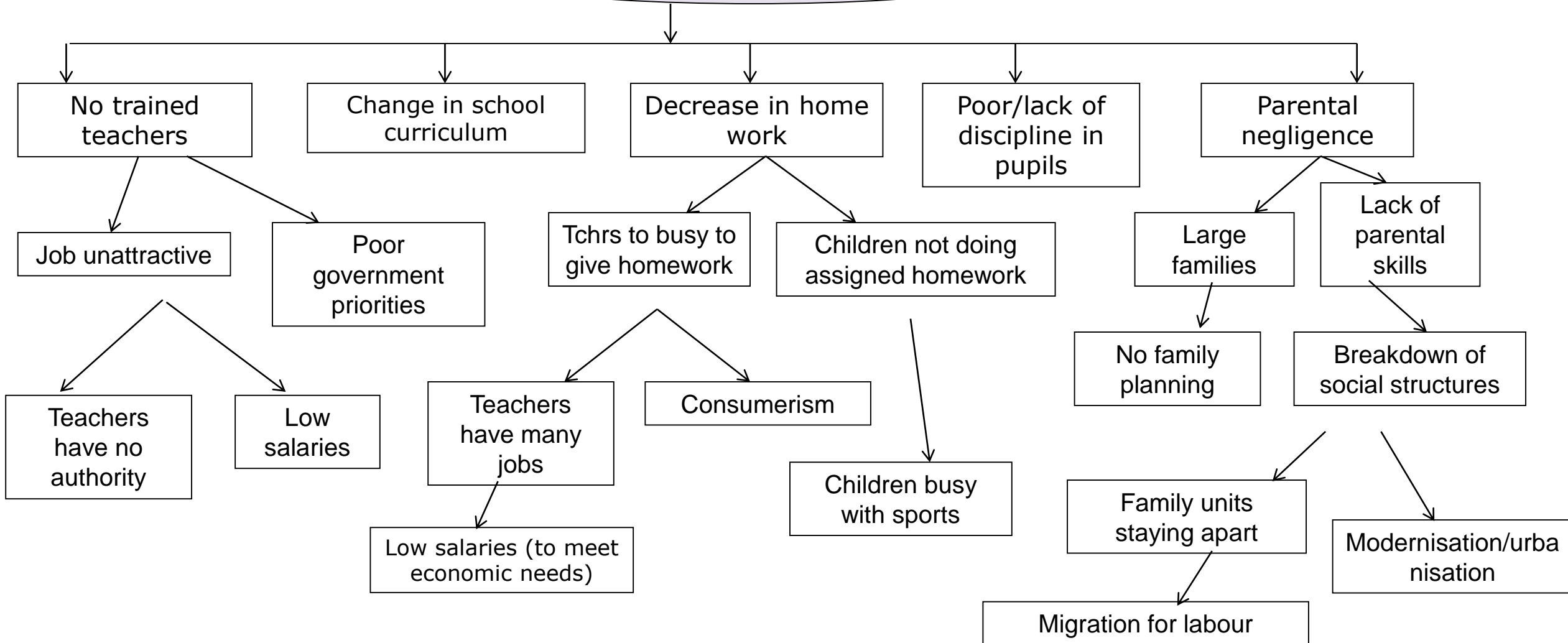

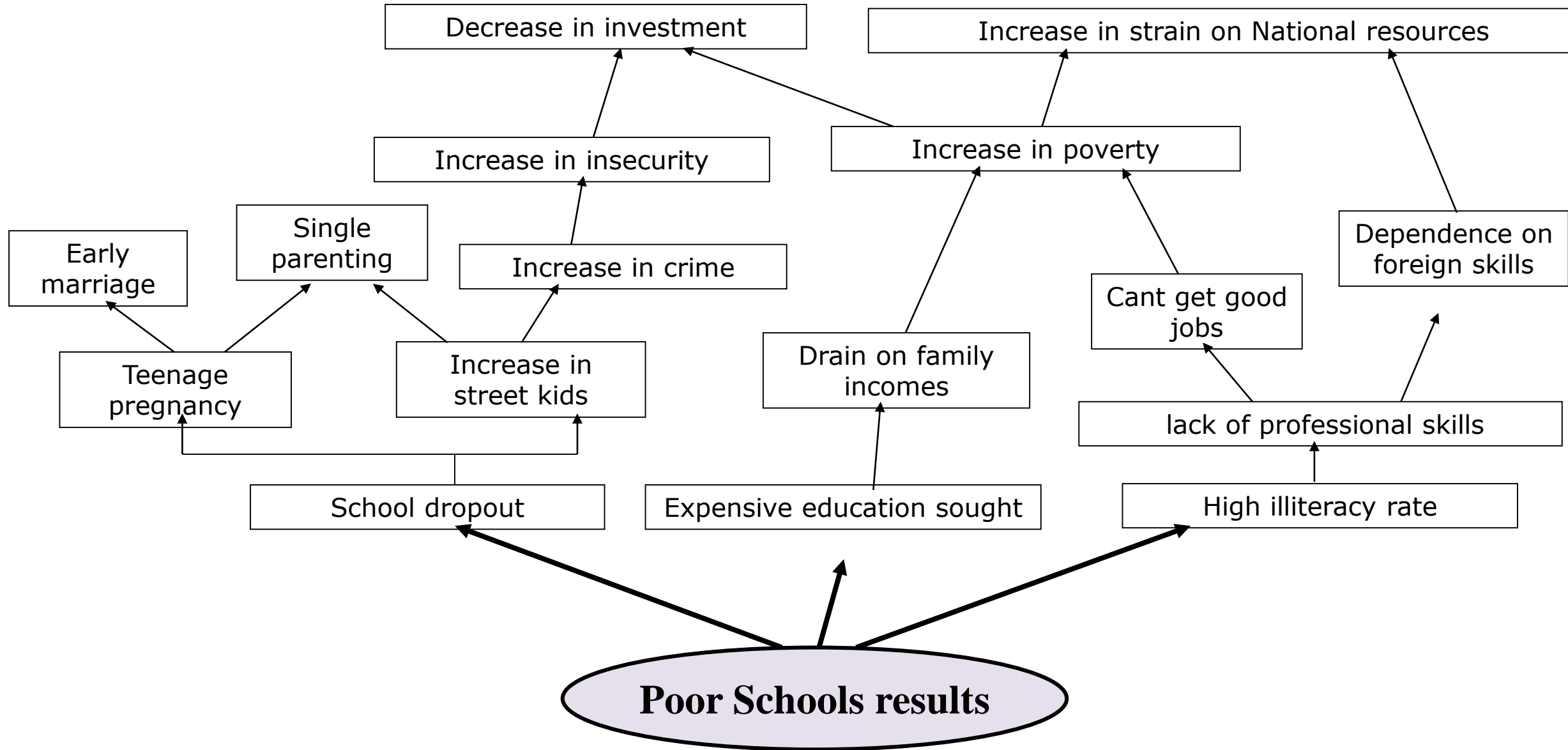

Poor Schools results in ...



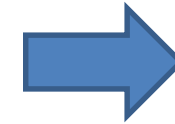
EXAMPLE – Effects

Problem

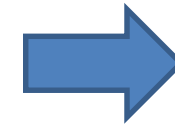
A problem stated positively becomes a Purpose/Goal – an end to which you are working. The reason for the intervention

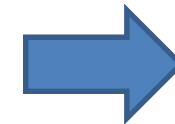
Causes have a hierarchy, some can become results while others activities.

Causes 2

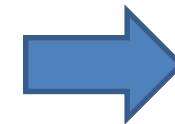
Select objectives based on what you can achieve within a timeframe and within your means and Strategic Plan and direction,

Indicators

GOALS

- A goal is the big picture of what you want the final outcome to be.
- A goal is much broader than objectives and activities
- A goal is related to the project need statement or the problem
- It must be simply stated.

OBJECTIVES

- An objective is a performance measure that would lead to achieving the goal.
- An objective should be specific, concrete, measureable, and time framed

OBJECTIVES

- A goal may have a few or several objectives.
- Keep in mind the following when developing objectives:
 - ❖ Who/What/Where
 - ❖ Expected outcomes (results of activities)
 - ❖ Measures
 - ❖ Criteria for achieving the expected outcomes
 - ❖ Timeframe

ACTIVITIES

- Activities are the processes and actions that meet the objective.
- An objective can have one or multiple activities.
- Keep in mind the following when assigning activities:
 - ❖ What activities/events will be performed?
 - ❖ Are the activities reasonable to the objective
